## “First Fruits”

You are invited, to brunch! Come join the Stewardship Committee, the Session, and the Deacons – dine, fellowship, and learn with the entire membership of Wasatch Presbyterian. **IMAGINE:** *You are a small farmer 150 years ago, or maybe 2500 years ago.*

*It has been a long, hard, cold winter. The canned and dried stores of last summer's bounty have been consumed. The rice you traded for is gone, and there is only a little wheat left. Your diet for the end of winter has been largely small portions of bread, milk from your solitary cow, and what ever you could hunt: a little deer, more squirrel.*

*But spring finally arrived, and after the lake melted, you could re-introduce fish to the menu. Spring has been kinder, and the crops are growing. We pass on into summer, and the first of the crops are nearing harvest. The green tomatoes are itching to turn red (or, maybe, it's you that's “itching” for them to ripen and enjoy their wonder). The early wheat, which we ran out of entirely last month, is about to be harvested, so there will be bread again. Unfortunately the peaches and grapes won't be ready until August, but we'll patiently wait for those delights.*

*Yet, you know it will be a while before you taste **any** of these early harvests. For you have pledged that your first fruits will be for God. You will get to enjoy the bounty of summer, but not until later. The **first fruits** of your labor are committed to God and God's people.*

This is one understanding of Exodus' call to offer our first fruits to God. Another understanding of this invitation is that we tithe the best of those tomatoes, peaches, and wheat all season long, keeping the “seconds” for our use.

However, in such a time as this, when for most of us the “harvest” comes

pretty evenly throughout the year, what is the implication of “first fruits”? Is it that we give the first month’s earnings in its entirety to the service of God? This could be a rather literal interpretation of the calling to give our *first fruits*, but not the only one.

Popular budgeting wisdom of the times tells us to pay our rent or mortgage, gas, electric, water, other obligations like auto loans and credit card purchases from months long ago, and, of course, the cell phone bills first. Then we should “live” off of the rest: clothing, movies, fun gadgets, meals, and the like. Generally speaking, what we can afford to give comes out of this latter piece of the financial harvest - after all the other “necessities”.

But, then there is Winston Churchill. I don’t know if he realized it, or intended to be, but he was quite a revolutionary, spreading a seriously counter-cultural message. If we “make a life”, or if we *live*, by what we give, this is another reason to give of our “first fruits.” To do otherwise, to give of “later fruits” or “seconds,” would mean the postponing/cheapening of *life* itself, of *living*.

While the producers of things we consume would like us to put them first in our accounting practices, I doubt this is the financial advice Christ would lay out. Christ and Winston Churchill, I suspect, would challenge us to first decide what we want to give, and then live on the rest (including the mortgage, a 60” wide-screen TV, life insurance, and the cell phone). And I also suspect determining what we *want* to give to the church and others, isn’t arrived at, or governed by, “back of the envelope” calculations as to “what’s affordable”.

Rather, this amount is actually derived from what we *want* to give. What we *want to give*, in helping others, spreading the Good News, in bringing about social justice, feeding the hungry, in tending to those in need – whether it be physical needs, loneliness, or being “lost” emotionally or spiritually. The gift is derived from what we *want to give* in response to all that we have received. It is derived from what we *want to give* based on the love we have for God and all the “others” in the world, both near and far away.

In making a life by what we give, let’s choose to *live first*.

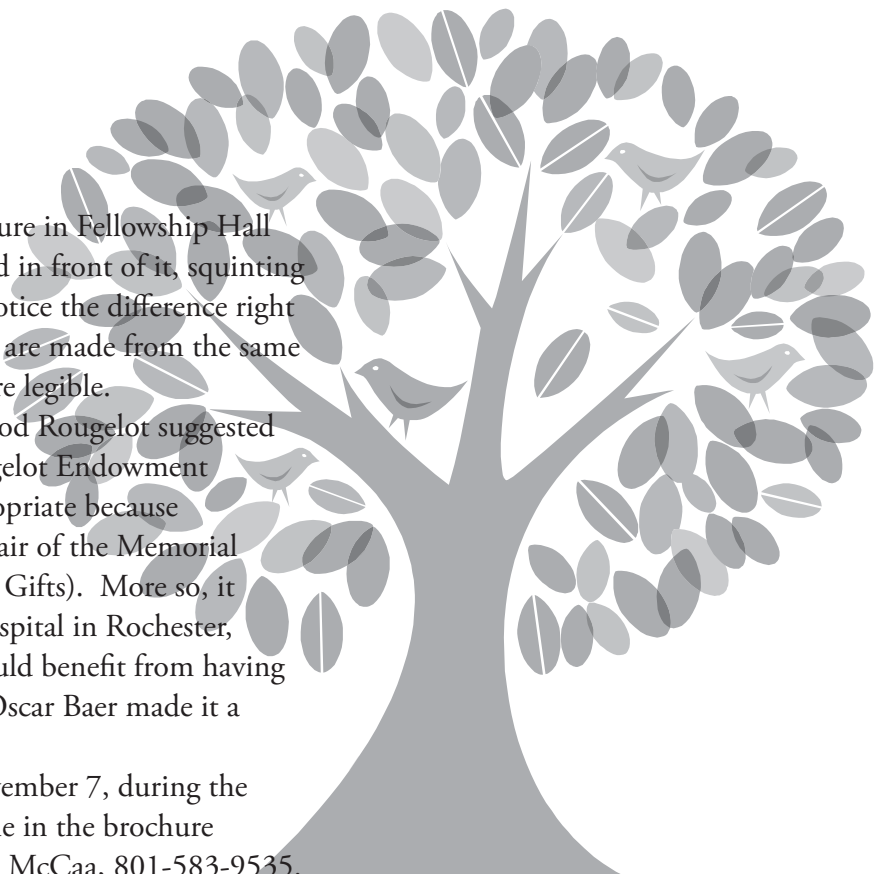

## ***The Living Tree Has a New Look***

The leaves on our beautiful Living Tree sculpture in Fellowship Hall are now a lot easier to read. If you have ever stood in front of it, squinting and trying to catch the light just right, you will notice the difference right away. The smaller leaves that have been inscribed are made from the same material as the larger ones and are now much more legible.

This improvement was made possible when Rod Rougelot suggested using some of the interest from the Carol S. Rougelot Endowment for the project. He felt this was particularly appropriate because Carol, who passed away in 2002, was a former chair of the Memorial and Endowments Committee (now called Special Gifts). More so, it was Carol, who upon seeing a similar Tree in a hospital in Rochester, Minnesota, immediately determined Wasatch would benefit from having one. A generous gift from the late Annabel and Oscar Baer made it a reality in 1994.

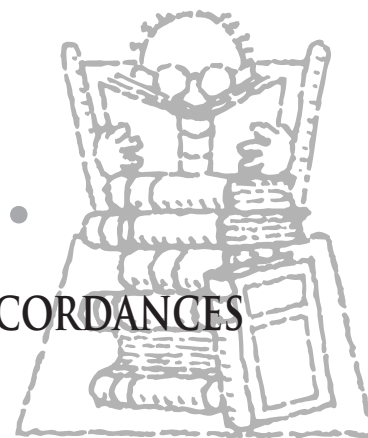

# Library Book Notes . . .



## REFERENCE BOOKS:

Check out the shelves to the right as you enter the library. Our Library is one of the best equipped to support adult education programs I've seen outside of a seminary library.

## BIBLES:

Want to compare translations? We have nearly every translation available, from the *Jerusalem Bible* (Catholic) to the *Living Bible* in modern language. We also have the *Hebrew Bible [Tannach]* and various paraphrased versions, including *The Cotton Patch Version* of one of Paul's letters (which you will find in the New Testament section).

## STUDY AIDS:

What's a cubit? What was the role of women in Abraham's time compared to Paul's? The best of the best resource for these questions and more, from my point of view, is the five volume set of the *New Interpreter's Bible Dictionary*. You can find everything and anything you might want or need to know in readable and clear language, whether it is sin, Satan and the Devil, thank goodness, God, Christ, Holy Spirit, and much more.

## BIBLE DICTIONARIES/CONCORDANCES

## ATLASES/ HISTORY:

You need it? We got it. New in the library is a big, but beautiful copy of *Christianity: An Illustrated Guide to 2000 Years of History*. It has more than just the early periods; this book tells you about the growth of Christianity in current times in the United States, Canada, Australia, etc.

It has wonderful photographs and good text.

Feel free to pull the books off the shelf while in a class. Just leave them in the "Return Book" basket. If you would like to keep one a week or so, check it out on the clip board on the library counter.

## YOUNG READERS

Children's books range through all reading levels. Try the following:

*Lincoln's Little Girl*, by Fred Trump. This book tells the true story of a little girl, Grace Bedell, who wrote to Lincoln during the 1860 campaign advising him to grow whiskers. They exchanged letters and she got to meet him at a train stop. The book goes on to tell of her later life during her homestead in Kansas. This is suggested for readers in grades 5 through 8. It may be a little dry for some, but the letters themselves are very good and should hold interest. Parents might like it too!

*Onion John*, by Joseph Krumgold, won the Newberry Medal ten years ago and is still popular with 9 - 12 year olds. Andy Rusch is happy playing baseball and working summers in the family hardware store. His father plans for him to become an engineer. Andy's best friend is Onion John, not the person his father wants to see influencing his son...and the tale goes on from there.

*Skylark*, by Patricia MacLachlan, sequel to the Newberry Medal winner, *Sarah, Plain and Tall*, continues the story of Sarah and Jacob and their children, Anna and Caleb, and what happens when a fierce drought strikes the prairie. MacLachlan packs a lot into this spare tale and never strays from the child's point of view, even when showing adult behavior. The happy result is emotional impact without sticky sentimentality. It is suggested for grades 4 through 6.
